A Brief History of the Westerville Quilt Guild

"Why am I going elsewhere for a quilt guild? I know there are enough quilters in Westerville to have our own guild."

That was how this all got started. I made that statement to my husband as I was leaving to attend a meeting at CMQ. That was in August 2004. The next morning I was still thinking about it and decided to look into starting a Westerville quilt guild. I sent emails out to members of the CMQ who lived in Westerville. I put up invitations everywhere I could for anyone interested to contact me. I then decided to host a meeting at my home and put up invitations everywhere as well as a flag on my front porch - "Welcome Quilters!" The response was not overwhelming. On September 29, 2004, the following people showed up: Debi Blalog, Pat Hamway, Mitzi Arnold, Judy Krol, Joan Tuttle, and Lisa Smith. We decided we could do this. And we chose to have the *President-of-the-Month* meeting format instead of the usual elected officials that planned every program for the year. We felt this would encourage participation from the members and hopefully allow for a broader range of meeting topics.

I sent out a newsletter for all Westerville quilters on Thursday, September 30, 2004. We had a better response to that and had each one invite one at the next meeting. We found out we could hold a meeting at the Library - what a stroke of luck that was.


We decided to make several bookmarks (about 500) to advertise our "organizational" meeting at the Library. These we distributed to quilt shops in the area, the library and every place that would let us leave them. The meeting was scheduled for January 10, 2005. It was standing room only. We had so many people in attendance the library decided we were too big - they could not accommodate us. However, it was at this meeting we had wonderful volunteers: Lisa Smith agreed to do our newsletters and continues to do that; Becky Stains accepted the treasurer position and served until just recently; and Shirley Thompson accepted the position of Historian, creating our guild scrapbooks.

Trish Bishop was instrumental in obtaining a meeting room for us at the City of Westerville Electric Division and they let us meet there for free. We had some really great meetings and workshops there but, eventually, they needed the room and we had to find another place to meet. That's when we met at a conference room at the Ohio Health Building until they decided to expand and we had to find another place. That place is the building we now meet in - the American Legion.

Our Guild has had its ups and downs but we are still here and hopefully we will grow still stronger in the coming years.

Mardis Gras — Fat Tuesday!

It's time to party it up, andeat!!

Fat Tuesday is the day before Ash Wednesday. It is also known as Mardi Gras Day or Shrove Day. It is a day when people eat all they want of everything and anything they want as the following day is Ash Wednesday, the beginning of a long fasting period for Christians. In addition to fasting, Christians also give up something special that they enjoy. So, Fat Tuesday is a celebration and the opportunity to enjoy that favorite food or snack that you give up for the long Lenten season.



Nowhere on the planet is Fat Tuesday celebrated more than on Bourbon Street in New Orleans. The day is celebrated with festivities and parades and of course much food and drink. While in New Orleans, a big tradition is in wearing Mardi Gras beads and giving them to others. And tradition requires that if a guy gives a girl some beads, she has to do something for him...this can be just loads of fun.

In addition to being called Mardi Gras Day and Fat Tuesday, it is also called Fastnacht Day. Pennsylvania Dutch country, and other areas with large German populations, refer to it as Fastnacht Day. The word translates to "Fast Night" in English. The tradition is to eat the very best foods, which are part of the German tradition, and lots of it, before the Lenten fast.
