



Three Yard Quilt - due Dec 2

The Westerville Quilt Guild has been gifted with fabric and project materials. We have kits for quilts, burp cloths, no-bind blankets as well as fabric yardage for totes or other projects. Kits will be available at the meeting.

We will bring the Burp Cloth Accuquilt die for anyone who would like to cut out burp cloths. The burp cloth die cuts an 8.5" x 18.5" shape. A generous fat quarter can yield (two pieces) one burp cloth. (NOTE: The 10" strip leftover from trimming the 30" square on the no-bind blankets is big enough for one shape.)

2025 Mystery Quilt — due Aug 26

This is an 8-part mystery quilt.
The fabric requirements were given out at the February meeting. Since are behind, the parts will be doubled up, so that there will be a 2-part clue at each meeting.

U.S. Earth Day — April 22

U.S. Senator Gaylord Nelson, the "Father of Earth Day", initiated and promoted eco-friendly environmental actions and activities beginning in 1962. He convinced then President



John F. Kennedy to tour the nation in support of environmental concerns. This initial effort did not spark national concern at a political level to effect change.

But Senator Nelson continued his pursuit of increased environmental concern and action. He proposed a National Earth Day in 1970. It was to be the first nationwide environmental protest "to shake up the political establishment and force this issue onto the national agenda". On April 22, 1970, the timing was right and the first Earth Day protest received astounding support.

On that first Earth Day, an estimated 20 million Americans took to the street in support of the environment and in protest of harmful environmental practices. Never mind that "protests" were in voque at the time. This effort produced a lasting impact on the environment and brought about greater awareness that our planet had limited resources and that our ecosystem was self-contained and finite. The things we are putting in the air, water, and earth were impacting us.

How to Celebrate U.S. Earth Day

Planet Earth is our home. It's the only home we have. Therefore, it is imperative that we protect its health and the planet's resources in any and every way that we can.

Here are some ways that you can make a difference:

- First and foremost, do what you can to minimize and reverse global warming.
