Get to Know this WQG member...



Name: Shannon Bartlett

Age: "Old Enough to Know Better— Young Enough To Do It Anyway"

How long have you been quilting and how did you get started? Did you learn from a family member, another quilter, by taking classes, or on your own?

I've been quilting for 15+ years. I started with a course from the Arlington Recreation Department when

I lived in the Washington, DC area. I didn't have a sewing machine so I learned how to piece by hand using templates. I remember going to a local quilt shop when I was just starting out and seeing a class on how to use the new rotary cutters.

Has anyone ever made a quilt for you? Do you have any antique quilts from your family or other sources?

My Great Aunt made a baby quilt for me when I was born. It was plain yellow blocks and white embroidered blocks of animals and birds. I still have the quilt and it is in great condition. I inherited Aunt Lilly's sewing box a few years ago. I was surprised to find the embroidery patterns and leftover floss from my baby quilt still in her sewing box. I also have a wedding ring quilt from my maternal Great Grandmother. The Overall Sam blocks that were started for my mother's baby quilt are another prized possession. They are made from old sugar sacks and some wonderful fabrics.

What is your biggest quilting challenge (appliqué, art quilts, paper piecing, etc.)?

Handwork and paper piecing are two of my challenges. I tend to be heavy handed when I do handwork so things are all stretched and distorted. I can paper piece but I don't enjoy it. (Guess it's the coloring in the lines sort of thing.) I'm not very good at positioning the fabric for the mirror flip so I tend to waste a lot of fabric.

Tell us about the quilting technique or style that you like the best (appliqué, paper piecing, art quilts, etc.).

I enjoy foundation piecing and the Chicago School of

Fuse. I don't have a lot of spare time to quilt so I like techniques that can get quick results. Patience is not one of my virtues.

Do you have any quilting helpers such as grandchildren, pets, or special music?

I'm fortunate to live with a quilter so I always have a sewing partner. There are also two worthless cats that haven't been much help in the sewing department. Aside from helping to determine color value (the white one only lays on dark fabric and the black one only lays on light fabric), they mostly sleep through our sewing marathons. Occasionally, one of them gets bored and likes to try and catch the sewing machine needle as it moves. Fortunately, they are easily distracted once the needle stops.

What is your favorite color and do you usually pick fabrics in this color family?

My favorite color changes from month to month. I like bright, pure colors. Right now, I'm working on two opposite pieces; one in hot colors (red, yellow, orange) and one in cool colors (turquoise and green). I seem to prefer hot colors in the winter and cool colors in the summer. I've been rusting fabric so I'm currently exploring ambers and earth tones.

If a genie granted you one quilting wish, what would it be?

Time to quilt and explore surface design techniques. I've got at least a million quilts ideas floating around in my head. There is so much to learn and so many new ideas and products available. I could easily spend the next twenty years working through my "wish list" of things to try and skills to master. My personal challenge for 2011 is to learn at least one new thing about a technique or surface design element every month. So far I've dabbled with paintsticks, screen printing, rusting fabric, PhotoShop Elements, mixed media collage, and turning photographs into quilts. I'm hoping to explore journaling, paper cloth, acrylic and fabric paints, sashiko, shibori dyeing, and thread sketching.

Chaimovich explains: "An important part of my design experience is the use of materials from clothes worn by people I don't know. I give them a life of their own and design my own creation.
