Quilting Customs and Superstitions

Superstitions Surrounding Quilts


One of the oddest superstitions that grew up around quilt making was brought back from the Orient on the China Clippers. According to the superstition, only God could create a perfect thing and if a human produced an object without some flaw, it would call the Devil and misfortune would follow. For this reason some quilts were made with a blue leaf or green flower in the design, to offset the evil. These quilts usually date from the early eighteen hundreds.



A quilt pattern that had a superstition surrounding it was one called Wandering Foot. A superstitious woman would never allow this pattern to be used on a quilt to cover a boy's bed. Wandering foot was a colloquial expression

for wanderlust. The evil influence of this quilt was supposed to be so great that any male sleeping under it would soon leave

home. However, it was fragile as most superstitions are; a woman simply had to name her quilt Turkey Tracks to render the superstition ineffective.

From an interview with "modern" quilter Malka Dubrawsky

- Q. Why do you think patchwork is perennially popular?
- A. This is going to sound way too philosophical, but I really do believe that patchwork endures because it mirrors our lives, especially women's lives, so well. Our days are patchworks of activities and roles. We put a piece of ourselves into being wives, mothers, employees, referees, gardeners, you name it and we divide ourselves into it. And, amazingly, it all comes together to create a unique and beautiful whole. Well, so does patchwork. It gathers a little of this and a little of that, puts it together with something as simple as needle and thread and creates a new, unique, and beautiful whole.
