Our guest speaker will be Rita Fishel, owner of the Creations SewClever Quilt Shop at 192 S. Paint Street in Chillicothe, Ohio. Her shop carries a full line of fabrics, quilt gadgets, books and of course the Creative Grids rulers. Rita will be demonstrating how to use the rulers and also will be bringing a supply of her books that she has authored. The rulers and books will be available for purchase.

Rita Fishel, a native of northeastern Ohio, has a BA in Clothing & Textiles/Business from the University of Akron, and certification in Machine Art through Sew Art International. In 1992 after relocating from Phoenix, AZ, she started Creations Sew-Clever, a full-line quilt shop now housed in an old 1863 Georgian-style funeral home in Chillicothe, OH.



Rita vends, teaches and demoes at all the national as well as many regional shows and lots of guild shows. She has published 2 books with AQS (Mystery Quilts and Everyday Quilts) and is currently working on her 3rd. She alsew writes for several quilt publica-

tions. Rita teaches on national and international Quilt Cruises and is a designer/consultant and National Demo Goddess for Creative Grids USA rulers. Although she keeps busy with a wide variety of quilt related activities, her very favorite thing to do is teach.

**June 25 - National Log Cabin Day

The Log Cabin Society, founded by Virginia Handy, and the Bad Axe Historical Society, in Michigan created the annual *Log Cabin Day on June 25, 1986*. Their objectives included promoting the preservation of Log Cabins, and awareness and education of life during the era in America when log cabins were common.

Log Cabin Day brings you back to a quieter, simpler, more rugged era. A couple hundred years ago, life was far more rugged. Americans moving West (west at the time may have been Ohio, or Tennessee) found an untouched wilderness, filled with pristine forests. They built their homes out of logs. These log cabins were solid, long lasting, and served them well.

Life was rustic and simple. Heat was provided by an open fireplace, where they also cooked their meals. Need air conditioning in the summer? Just open the window (there wasn't any glass or screening). There was no electricity (no television, stereos or boom boxes blasting, or computers). And, plumbing? Just look back towards the woods to the outhouse. The path to it is well worn.

Log Cabin Day celebrates what was then the "Modern" home in America, and all of the lifestyle that accompanied it. Today is a day to appreciate the history and significance of log cabins. Visit them at historical museums today, or sometime this summer.

Charm Squares

Squares are 6×6 of quilt shop quality fabric. Drop off current month, pick up

last month... etc. Here are the remaining months and themes:

June – Birds July – Patriotic August – Vegetables/Fruits September – Animals October – Harvest November/December – Holiday Relatives gathered in the waiting room of a hospital, where their family member lay gravely ill.
